

# **DuPont Historic Village Company Town Houses**

It started with wanting to prove the Dupont Company Town houses were made from Aladdin kits, and has turned into a much larger research project.

These houses were built between 1912 and 1917 a time when kit homes, such as Sears and Montgomery Wards house kits, were often used. DuPont resident Mary Brown, a retired english teacher, volunteered to research and write a final report for the DuPont Museum. Mary has interviewed a number of people who still live in a historic village home, people who grew up living in one of the houses, staff from the Hagley Museum and the Central Michigan University Museum, residents of other DuPont Company towns that have houses that look like ours and numerous other people. It will be interesting to read the final report once Mary melds all of the interviews together. Just one of those facts we've always thought was true, but could we prove it?

# Museum Photograph Collection.

You might ask, how many photos does the museum own? We would have to say, "we really don't know for sure, but our guess would be close to maybe 7,000?" Volunteers Sandy Fletcher and Robbin Goldsby would probably say, "At Least 7,000"!



Their goal is to make certain each photo is in a protective archival polypropylene sleeve that fits, each photo has an accession number assigned, and is in the correct subject folder and archival box. Volunteers Nancy Rudel and Carol Estep (not in photo) make sure each photo is scanned and cataloged into PastPerfect data base. A lot of the photos were given to the museum from the DuPont Company, when the Powder Works Plant closed 1976, and from people who worked at the plant and lived in DuPont. We also have a nice collection of school photos from when we were school district number 7, 1861-1973, and when were called the DuPont Fort Lewis School District with students from Fort Lewis attending school in DuPont.

Schools 1917-1973, including Laughbon High School, were located where Happy Teriyaki, Starbucks, and DuPont Dental etc. are now. We also have and collect photos from other eras of DuPont history, events and programs. We appreciate having photographs donated to the Museum of past and current DuPont history. We don't always think about saving photos and other items of importance while it is current, but 50 years from now, this will also be part of our history and people might ask why we didn't record it. When you donate photos, we appreciate if you can please provide the date, name of people in the photo and location.

# Photo Gallery of DuPont Mayor's

In 1909 a little town was built for the DuPont Company employees only, with all the property remaining in the ownership of the DuPont Company. On March 13, 1912, the village of DuPont became the town of DuPont with 60 of the 63 eligible voters agreeing to incorporate. The purpose of incorporation was to allow the sale of "retail intoxicating liquors" in the clubhouse. In 1926, prohibition era, the need was no longer there and they voted to disincorporate going back to a company run town. In 1951 the DuPont Co. gave permission for the residents to buy their homes donating the water, sewer and electric systems, and several lots for parks and children's playgrounds making it mandatory for some form of government. On April 16, 1951, the 500 residents of DuPont voted to incorporate again.

The City of DuPont staff have kept a record of mayors names and dates they served. Nancy Rudel, volunteer, has gathered photos of the mayors since 1951 to current day and compiled them into a chart form. Melissa has placed this chart on the museum website (dupontmuseum.com) under History, Historic Evolution of DuPont, Washington. We would like to thank everyone who worked with us and contributed photos for this project. We do not have photos of the three mayors from the first incorporation. Should you have photos of George Shepherd 1912, Edmund Brown 1914 and P.M. Harrington 1916-1926, we would appreciate a digital copy. All three were probably DuPont Company employees.

# YOUR ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP AND SUPPORT DONATIONS are very
