CLUES to USE. Locate the correct sign or monument & then read to learn the answer and more about the history of DuPont!

- 1. I was the Mayor of DuPont 1976-1979 & Postmaster when the postoffice was in the small building beside 76 gas station. (sign)
- 2. First school building, built in 1866, for school district #7 was located here. (sign or monument)
- 3. One of the "Firsts" that took place in the DuPont area? (Monument)
- 4. We all lived in DuPont and served in World War II (monument).
- 5. My job was to deliver supplies and dynamite to the wharf to be shipped out. (sign)
- 6. "DuPont Ladies" picking apples from 1843 orchard. Who planted the apple trees? (sign)
- 7. I was Chief Factor of 1843 Ft. Nisqually. (sign)
- 8. We worked in the dynamite plant and we lived in "tiny houses" covered with tarpaper. What was this location called? (sign)
- 9. How many years have the Nisqually People lived in this area? (sign)
- 10. In the early 1920s, DuPont fire company #11 was the youngest firefighting department in the United States. Why? (sign)
- 11. Dr. Richmond, missionary, and his family lived here 1840-1842. (monument)
- 12. I came to the DuPont area in May of 1841 to survey the lands and Puget Sound. I also celebrated the first 4th of July north of the Columbia River. (monument)
- 13. This cable tramway of buckets was also called by another name. (sign)
- 14. In the 1800s, this land was made up of boundless prairies with a great view of Mt. Rainier. (sign)
- 15. I was a natural leader of my people and in 1858 I was wrongly convicted and hung for a murder I did not commit. (sign)
- 16. I was an HBC employee, farmer and and of Scottish descent. Some of my descendants still live in the DuPont region. (sign)
- 17. What three large companies have at different times been in control of the DuPont area? (sign)
- 18. I lived in this area 1840-1841 teaching Native American children and am considered the "First School Teacher". (statue)
- 19. Memorial dedicated to those citizens of DuPont who fought the war on terrorism. What year was it dedicated? (monument)
